Background/Context

Hauora Heretaunga is a GP practice with 6300 enrolled patients 90% of which are of Maori or Pacific Island descent. Hauora Heretaunga has 53% more high needs compared to other Hawkes Bay General Practices.

The project has derived from data that has shown that cellulitis is the leading cause of hospital admissions for patients aged 0-4 years and enrolled with Hauora Heretaunga. Data shows that admissions over the past three years are increasing.

Comparing eczema related discharges per 1000 enrolled population between 2016-2018 between other practices in the locality Hauora Heretaunga is consistently higher. It is not uncommon for eczema to be referred by our GPs or nurse Practioner where infected flairs are out of control.



Capturing the Patient Experience

- We organised a meeting with a number of whanau who have experienced and live with eczema on a daily basis.
- This was a very valuable step of our process and gave the most insight as to what is going to be most beneficial for our whanau when developing this project. The feedback we received was that a lot of the stresses that come with eczema are emotional and that there is a gap in that there is a lack of emotional supports that are available for whanau dealing with eczema.
- It was also identified that alternative medicines were the treatment of choice when they could afford it.
- Whanau input and consultation will be paramount in developing this project, they will be active participants in this journey.
